PRESS STATEMENT ON THE WITHDRAWAL OF SECURITY DETAIL FOR THE CJ



"we point out that the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, establishes firm, elaborate and independent institutions, whose mutual understanding and interdependent operations provide a lasting safeguard for good governance for the people of Kenya. Importantly, the Constitution contemplates three distinct arms of government of similar status and priority to ensure their ability to uphold necessary checks and balances. The mistaken perception that the Judiciary is subordinate to the other arms of government is a historic bastardization of the principle of separation of powers, which must be deconstructed. The National Police Service is established as part of the Organs of National Security which must serve all people and institutions equally and without prejudice. The inveterate habit of the Service operating as an appendage of the Executive, giving undue credence to the superiority of the Executive over the Judiciary is an unacceptable relic. The complaint raised by the Chief Justice indicates an insufferable failure on the part of the National Police Service which must be rectified promptly, and action taken to prevent any reoccurrence."

<u>"</u>The conduct of the Supreme Court raises fundamental questions about judicial conduct, fairness, its broader implications for the legal profession and public confidence in the judiciary. Extending the ban to advocates employed in or associated with Mr. Ahmednasir's law firm, along with their clients, infringes on the right to earn a living, the independence of the legal profession, and the right to legal representation. Disturbingly, the Court has condemned associates without disclosing any offence they have committed against it, simply by virtue of their association. This action not only undermines the rule of law but also denies clients the freedom to choose legal representation, a fundamental tenet of access to justice guaranteed under the Constitution." - LSK President, Faith Odhiambo

UPDATE -PROCESSING OF PRACTICING CERTIFICATES FOR THE YEAR 2025

Further to our Notice, <u>Click Here</u>, dated 10th January, 2025, we wish to notify members of the progress in processing and issuance of Practicing Certificates for the year 2025.

As at 26th January 2025, the Law Society of Kenya had received and invoiced a total of 10,947 practicing certificate applications. We note that 6,848 members have paid for their certificates, while 4,099 are yet to pay. So far, 5,604 Practicing Certificates 2025 have been processed and issued.

In the course of verification, the Secretariat has flagged a total of 707 applications with inconsistences which include incomplete, inaccurate or incorrect documents. These anomalies have been communicated to the respective members for rectification.

Kindly note that receipts and/or practicing certificates will not be issued until regularization of the correct uploaded documents. Additionally, verification is a continuous process and members with outstanding issues will continue to receive assistance to ensure the immediate resolution of any pending matters.

2025 THE YEAR TO ADVOCATE AGAINST ENFORCED DISAPPEARANCE

The International Convention for the Protection of All Persons from Enforced Disappearance defines "enforced disappearance" as the arrest, detention, abduction, or any other form of deprivation of liberty by agents of the State or by persons or groups of persons acting with the authorization, support or acquiescence of the State, followed by a refusal to acknowledge the deprivation of liberty or by concealment of the fate or whereabouts of the disappeared person, which places such a person outside the protection of the law.

Historically "Disappearances" emerged as a human rights problem in the 1970s, at the height of the Cold War-and initially in the Latino nations of Chile and Argentina. The term "disappearance" was coined in Chile, because the Peace Committees (the ecumenical organization that preceded the Vicariate of Solidarity) stopped receiving information concerning the whereabouts of some prisoners they were represented and it was alleged that they had disappeared. This human rights issue precipitated the massive habeas corpus applications filed in Chile for 131 people, and the courts didn't know what to do about them. According to the human rights historical accounts Chile's, systematic practice of "disappearances" lasted from 1973 to 1977, with about 1,300 people disappearing. This is in addition to the 2,000 people who were killed outright in extra-judicial executions. The practice of disappearances was also taken up in Argentina at a much larger scale and likewise lasted for four years, from 1976 to 1980.

Conceptually, one can distinguish "disappearances" from the behavioral patterns that in some ways were similar and common: people have gone missing-which happens in every society; men missing in action-which happens in every war; incommunicado detention; irregular incommunicado detention; and abduction. According to Amnesty International enforced disappearance is a complex crime, involving several crimes that were always present and other crimes that one had every reason to believe had also been perpetrated. Disappearance, as observed from the Kenyan context, involves the crimes of arbitrary detention or abduction, obstruction of justice, and cruel treatment of families who don't know the whereabouts of their kin. The other crimes that are presented by the crime include torture, killing, and illegal disposal of the bodies. It has been noted that "Disappearance", just like other complex crimes such as apartheid or ethnic cleansing, presupposes a cluster of behaviors that are comprised within such elaborate criminal practice.

Kenya is at the precipice of tipping into another cluster of historical injustice that is pitting internet human rights soldiers against unpopular governance issues. We #Wakilis must stay vigilant and continue to call out atrocities and support victims of disappearances in all our spaces. After all Black is for the people, Green is for our land, Red is for the Kenyan blood and White is for the peace we aspire to always have.
